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Squirty's Words . . . From The Rainbow Bridge

Question: More and more people are going to see Holistic doctors nowadays. Is there a Holistic option for pets?

Answer: Yes, there is! Many people, uneasy when their conventional vets (or their own conventional doctors) prescribe medications that can be potentially dangerous or come with too many unwanted side effects, turn to Holistic medical professionals instead. A Holistic veterinarian and a conventional veterinarian both must earn a DVM (doctor of veterinary medicine) degree before entering their professions. A Holistic veterinarian then may choose to train in any of several specialties including herbal, physical rehabilitation, massage, and acupuncture, as well as other therapies.

A Holistic DVM uses an integrative approach to treatment, looking at your pet as a whole and treating the underlying condition rather than simply treating the symptoms, and is much less likely to prescribe drugs as a first choice course of action.

Of course, because a Holistic veterinarian is a doctor of veterinary medicine, he or she is able to prescribe drugs if necessary. In an emergency or acute situation where natural methods may not work or may not offer fast enough results, a Holistic veterinarian may use drugs or other methods that a conventional veterinarian would use.

There are many ways to find a Holistic vet in your area. You can ask other pet owners, speak with someone at your local pet store, or check the web site for the American Holistic Veterinary Medical Association at ahvma.org/find-a-holistic-veterinarian. Question: My vet said that my cat has extra teeth. Should I be concerned? Do dogs ever have extra teeth?



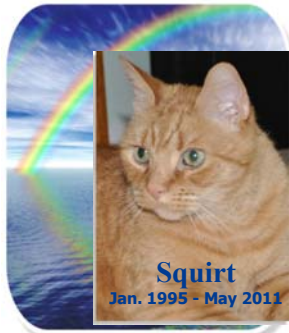
Answer: An adult cat has 30 teeth and an adult dog has 42 teeth. Compared to an adult human's 32 (or 28 if they've had all 4 wisdom teeth removed), dogs are by far much toothier than cats *or* people!

Sometimes, however, a cat or dog may have extra teeth, known as supernumerary teeth, caused by a condition called hyperdontia. This is actually more common in dogs than in cats. For both, it occurs more frequently with adult teeth than with baby teeth.

While supernumerary teeth aren't necessarily a problem, having extra teeth can lead to damage to the normal teeth, overcrowding, and periodontal disease. Sometimes the extra teeth are impacted.

Regardless of whether your cat or dog has too many teeth, not enough teeth, or the exact number of teeth he or she is supposed to have, it is always important to have their teeth checked on a regular basis. Your vet will let you know if there is any reason for concern and will recommend appropriate treatment if it is needed.

as Breezy, who also happens to be my long-time girlfriend) from a rescue group that does TNR. That stands for Trap-Neuter-Release or Trap-Neuter-Return. They catch stray and feral cats by placing yummy food inside a cage with a trap-door. Then they take the cats to be spayed or neutered and either find forever homes for them or, if they are too feral to be able to live with humans, return them to the area where they were found.

Mom said, "Helen is working with someone else in the group who wants to open a little burger and sandwich shop where people could meet the dogs that are available for adoption. They want to name it the 'Downtown Grill and Pup'."

"Cute." Dad chuckled.

Mom went on to describe her vision. "Imagine, instead of just tables and booths like most cafes, there would be *some* tables in the café area, and then the far wall of the café would be made entirely of glass. Through that wall of glass, you'd be able to see the area where the cats would be, with cozy little alcoves with benches or oversized soft chairs. Maybe a window seat or two. Lots of fluffy pillows and super-soft lap blankets. And sisal-covered poles that the cats

could climb, leading up to shelves and cubby-hole boxes built onto the walls, so they could relax and observe not only everything that's going on in their room, but also in the café."

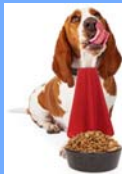

believe that a cat can't be trained," Mom said to Mallory, "Or that all cats are aloof and unfriendly, or that cats steal the breath from a baby?"

Breezy and I locked eyes when we heard that last one, both of our faces wearing confused expressions.

"Steal the breath from a baby?" Breezy whispered, shuddering. "How could that be possible, even if cats *were* that mean?"

"Why would someone think that, about cats and babies?" Mallory asked, as if she'd heard Breezy.

Mom shrugged. "They've heard it or been told it was true, over the years, and they probably never had a cat or had any experience to show them it isn't true."

Mom and Mallory structured their program around addressing each of several common beliefs and misconceptions that caused people to resist the idea of having a cat for a pet.

Their program includes tips for

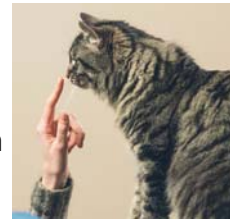

keeping a clean and odor-free litterbox, demonstrations on how to teach cats tricks, advice on fun and scratch-free playtime, and a helpful list of cat-facts.

Mom and Mallory also teach people who are inexperienced with cats the difference in how to introduce yourself to a cat vs a dog. We cats have a different way of processing sensory input than dogs and we can be overwhelmed if approached excitedly, loudly, or roughly. We need time to sniff you and feel comfortable before we're ready to be petted. We respond very well to the technique Jackson Galaxy calls the "finger nose", so Mom and Mallory teach it as part of their program.



Have you ever seen two cats walk up to each other and touch noses? That's one of the ways we say hello. Holding out your finger to us and letting us touch our nose to your fingertip works in the same way, and will often lead a cat to pet your hand with his or her head!

Mom often likes to quote a favorite aunt of hers, who once said, "I used to think I didn't like cats . . . until I met one."

- untrue and was likely created with the intention of keeping children from disturbing the nests. That being said, it is important to note that bird's nests, as well as any wild animals or birds, should not be disturbed.
- Ostriches lay their eggs in large holes in the ground, and a few times a day, ostrich parents can be seen checking on their eggs by sticking their heads into the holes, but that is the closest they come to the myth of burying their heads. They don't bury their heads.
 - Owls can turn their heads up to 270 degrees, which, if attempted by a human would damage blood vessels in the neck or block blood supply to the brain, but they are not capable of a 360-degree rotation.
 - A light touch to a butterfly's wing won't cause lasting damage, but butterfly wings are very delicate and contain veins which, if broken, can cause the butterfly to die. It's always best to resist touching butterflies, but if your hand should accidentally brush gently against one, you don't have to be worried that you have harmed it.
 - This is sort of a trick-question because of the way it is worded. *All* bees do not die after stinging once, but honeybees *do*. A honeybee's stinger is different from the stingers of other bees and, because it has backward-facing barbs, it gets lodged in the skin and cannot be pulled out. In order for the honeybee to fly away after a sting, it must mortally injure itself to disconnect from its stinger. This does not happen to other types of bees, however.
 - Warts are caused by a human virus that is not present on a frog or a toad, *however*, frogs and toads can come with their own non-wart-causing dangers, ranging from toxins in their skin that can cause pain if they are touched, to neurotoxins that can potentially kill.
 - A rattlesnake uses the rattles on its tail as a warning that they are there. Generally shy and harmless if left alone, a rattlesnake will strike if it is startled or feels threatened, and they do not always rattle before striking.
 - Changing color to blend into surroundings sounds like a superhero ability and it would be very cool if any animal or person could do it, but alas, the reason a chameleon changes color has more to do with communicating its moods as well as with temperature and light.
 - A turtle's shell is a living part of its body and even has its own blood and nerve supply, which means a turtle can feel when its shell is touched. If the shell is damaged, the turtle not only can feel pain, but is also at risk of potentially deadly infection.
 - The piranha, a type of fish that lives in South American rivers and lakes, is generally understood to be shy and unaggressive, despite its sharp teeth. They mostly scavenge for fish, insects, and plants. In 1914, Theodore Roosevelt made a trip to Brazil where he saw piranhas quickly eat the meat off of a dead cow in a staged hoax for tourists in which captive fish were cruelly starved for days.
 - While a female praying mantis may occasionally eat the male after mating, this is not normal behavior for the species.
 - It is absolutely not true that turkeys drown in the rain.
 - Bats are not blind. In fact, some can see very well.
 - A camel's hump actually stores fat - enough that the camel can go for 3 weeks without eating.
 - Crocodiles are actually fast on land - probably faster than a human, in fact!
 - While cats are agile and able to readjust their position in mid-air, they do not always land on their feet. This is very important to know - never drop a cat from a height and don't let them get onto high balconies where they could possibly fall and get hurt!

Peanut Butter Alert for Your Pets

A new type of peanut butter (and other nut butters) is being sold with less sugar, but now includes xylitol as a sweetener. That is what is used in sugarless gum and it can be deadly to dogs. Many people use peanut butter as a dog treat, or to fill a Kong, or disguise medications; if they now use the type with xylitol, it could be very dangerous.

This warning has been shared on Facebook over 650,000 times as of the publication date of this issue of *Burlington Reports*, but it bears repeating for anyone who may not have already seen it.
